




#### **US Child (under 18) Population: Number and** % of Overall Population, 1960-2022




#### Number of US Births (in Millions of Children Born), 1960-2022\*








# US Adolescent Birth Rates (per 1,000 Women) by Age Group, 1970-2022\*








#### Race and Ethnicity of US Children (under 18), Recorded (1980-2022) and Projected (2023-2050)




# Percent of US Non-Hispanic White Children (under 18) by State, 2022



Percent of US Non-Hispanic White Children (under 18) US Population: 49%




# Percent of US Hispanic or Latino Children (under 18) by State, 2022








# Percent of US Non-Hispanic Black Children (under 18) by State, 2022








# Percent of US Non-Hispanic Asian Children (under 18) by State, 2022









# Percent of US Non-Hispanic American Indian and Alaskan Native Children (under 18) by State, 2022








### % of US Children (under 18) Who Are Immigrants, 1994-2022



### Growth in the Number of US Children\* (under 18) by Immigrant Status, 1994-2022




# Percent of US Children (under 18) in Immigrant\* Families by State, 2022






#### % of US Children (Ages 5-17) Who Speak a Language Other Than English at Home, 1979-2022

# % of Persons in the US Living Below the Official Poverty Level by Age Group, 1980-2022\*



## % of US Children (under 18) Living Below the Poverty Level by Race/Ethnicity, 1980-2022\*






#### Percent of US Children (under 18) in Poverty by State, 2022






#### % of US Children (under 18) by Family Income Relative to the Official Poverty Level, 1980-2022

<sup>\*</sup>Prior to 2007, children with two unmarried parents in the household may be identified as "mother only" or "father only." Starting in 2007, a second parent identifier permits identification of two co-resident parents, even if the parents are not married to each other.

Note: Estimates for 2019 and beyond are not directly comparable to previous years due to data collection and processing changes resulting in shifts in estimates of the number of parents with whom children live and the type of relationship (biological, step, or adoptive) between children and their parent(s).



#### **Population Characteristic Takeaways**

- The number of US children has marginally declined the last couple of years
- Children are a shrinking portion of the population
- The adolescent birth rate continues to decline
- % of Hispanic and Asian children has gone up, whereas % of White children has declined
- % of children in immigrant families increased but is stabilizing around 25%
- % of children who speak a language other than English has gone up but is leveling off
