Getting Back in the Saddle after an Event: Recognizing, Treating, Recovering from, and Potentially Preventing Second Victim Syndrome

T was just a.... and before I knew it Critical events happen in the blink of an eye to the best of us. As pediatric surgeons, we take care of the sickest and smallest patients and things are always looming. After a serious event, surgeons suffer along with their patients and families experiencing a myriad of symptoms which can include (continuously running through the events, intrusive thoughts, feelings of inadequacy, and other manifestations) which is termed *Second Victim Syndrome*. The AAP Trainee and Early Career Committee is hosting a webinar to discuss Second Victim Syndrome and how to support yourself and your partners, locating resources both at your institution and out, and how this may differ depending on your practice type or location. We hope this will be a practical, informative talk for those newly into practice and those approaching practice but feel that the information is valuable for all no matter your stage in practice.
