ABOUT PLACES

PLACES is a longitudinal cohort study tracking the experiences and opinions of pediatricians over time.

There are 3 important cohorts:

Participating since 2012:

- 1) 2002-04 Residency Graduates Cohort, n=894
- 2) 2009-11 Residency Graduates Cohort, n=896

Participating since 2019:

3) 2016-18 Residency Graduates Cohort, n=915

PLACES pediatricians are surveyed twice a year:

- Main study survey
- Shorter survey, focused on topics selected by participants

Strengths of PLACES:

- Longitudinal design
- Inclusion of both AAP members and non-members
- Range of content (work, satisfaction, personal dimension)
- Commitment of pediatricians, like you!

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

TOPICS PLACES PEDIATRICIANS WANT ON NEXT SURVEY

MARCH 2024

Three in four PLACES pediatricians completed the 2023 main study survey – thank you!

We want to make sure we include topics important to pediatricians on our surveys, so we asked you last fall to tell us which topics you would like us to ask about on the next survey (Figure 1).



The most commonly selected topic in Fall, 2023 was staff shortages at work (Figure 1) – over half of PLACES pediatricians (54%) selected staff shortages as a high priority topic for the next survey.

- The spring survey is **MUCH** shorter than the one you completed in the fall.
- It should only take 5-10 minutes to complete.

Please share your experiences and thoughts with us by completing the survey on staff shortages! We will share data with you in a future newsletter so you can see how other PLACES pediatricians responded.

What we learned from you in Fall, 2023

Stress at Work - Figure 2

The top work stressors for PLACES participants, with about half reporting they are moderately or very stressed, include:

- Finishing or catching up on work at home (54%)
- Documenting patient information in the EHR (47%)
- Completing required non-clinical activities (45%)

In contrast, fewer report feeling moderately or very stressed from providing clinical care to children and adolescents (32%)

- Just 5% report being very stressed
- The majority are only a little (50%) or not at all (18%) stressed

Pediatricians **earlier in their career** are more likely to report feeling moderately or very stressed about finishing work at home than those further along in their career:

- 2016-18 Cohort = 59%
- 2009-11 Cohort = 55%
- 2002-04 Cohort = 48%


2016-18 Cohort Mean age=37 years **2009-11 Cohort** Mean age=44 years **2002-04 Cohort** Mean age=51 years

Satisfaction Working with Families

PLACES pediatricians face many stressors at work but at the same time are satisfied working with patients and their families

- 94% agree their work contributes to the health of families in their community
- 92% agree their relationships with patients and their families are rewarding
- Nearly 9 in 10 find their present work personally rewarding
- Overall, 8 in 10 are pleased with their work
 - o 2016-18 Cohort = 79%
 - o 2009-11 Cohort = 81%
 - o 2002-04 Cohort = 86%

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Is PLACES reviewed by an institutional review board (IRB)?

PLACES was initially approved in November 2011 by the AAP IRB, and each year the IRB reviews the protocol, the PLACES surveys, and any changes to the study.

How are my data protected?

The IRB-approved procedures to protect your data and keep it confidential and secure include:

- 1) Identifying your data with a study ID number and not your name
- 2) Storing data on password protected computers in password protected files, or in locked file cabinets with access limited to key research staff at the AAP
- 3) Using a secure online data collection system that complies with US frameworks set by the Department of Commerce
- 4) Releasing only aggregate statistics

Have any measures been taken to enhance the protection of my data?

Yes! We received an extension of the Certificate of Confidentiality for PLACES from the federal government to continue to protect your data. This means we cannot be forced to disclose information you provide us that may identify you, even by a court subpoena, unless you request the disclosure.

The only time we can be forced to disclose your information, without your consent, is if you reported to us that you committed child abuse or intended to hurt yourself or others.
