ABOUT PLACES

PLACES is a longitudinal study that tracks the experiences and opinions of early career pediatricians over time

- There are 2 important cohorts
 - 1) Recent Residency Graduates
Most graduated in 2009-2011
 - 2) Early Career
Most graduated in 2002-2004
- 1,804 participants responded to the first annual survey in 2012 (93% of pediatricians initially interested), and the second annual survey is currently being conducted
- The strength of PLACES is the
 - ✓ longitudinal design
 - ✓ inclusion of both AAP members and non-members
 - ✓ range of content (work, satisfaction, personal dimension)

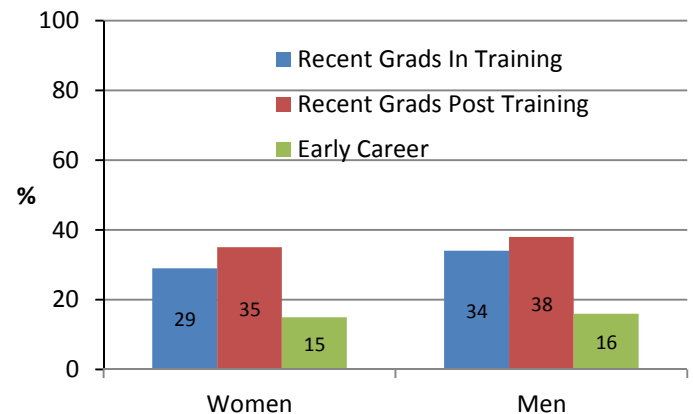

Figure 1. Percentage of PLACES Participants who Reported Pregnancy/Adoption/Having a Baby in Past 12 Months



Pediatricians in the recent grads cohort are more likely than the early career group to report pregnancy, adoption or having a baby in the past 12 months (Figure 1). Men and women are equally likely to report this major life event.

Participants reported various sources of child care while they are at work, with the majority reporting their spouse and over 1/4 reporting child care centers, nannies, and/or relatives (Figure 2). Men were more likely than women to have their spouse or partner care for their children, and women were more likely than men to have a relative, nanny, or child care center as their source of care (data not shown).

Figure 2. Sources of Child Care Used While Participants with Children ≤ 13 years are at Work

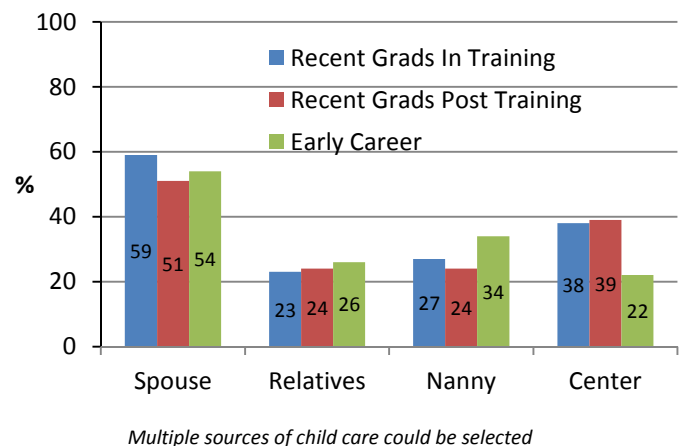
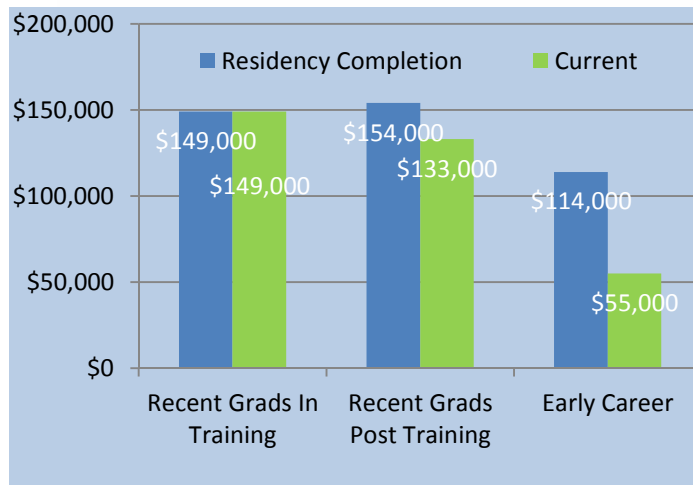


Figure 3. Mean Educational Debt at Residency Training Completion and Currently Among Participants with Debt*



* Includes only the subgroup of participants who report having debt at the completion of residency; does not include spouse or partner debt or consumer debt

- Participants who are in fellowship training are more likely to report higher current educational debt (Figure 3) and be very concerned about debt (Figure 4).
- The majority of participants report having educational debt at residency completion: 76% of the recent grads in training, 82% of the recent grads post training, and 72% of the early career. Figure 3 shows that the post training recent grad group's debt decreased by 14% and the early career group by 52% since residency training completion.

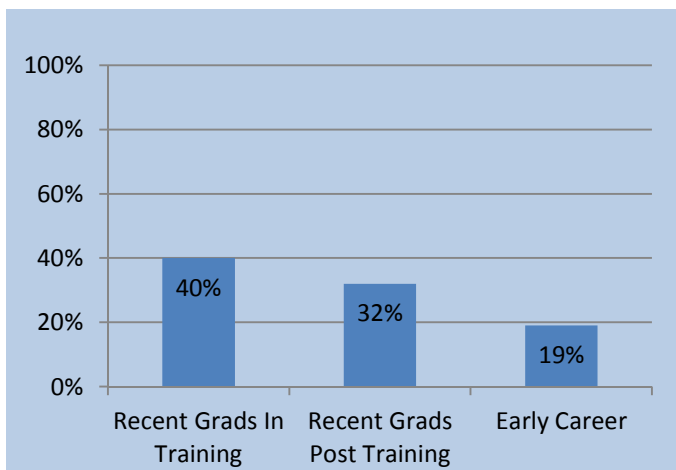
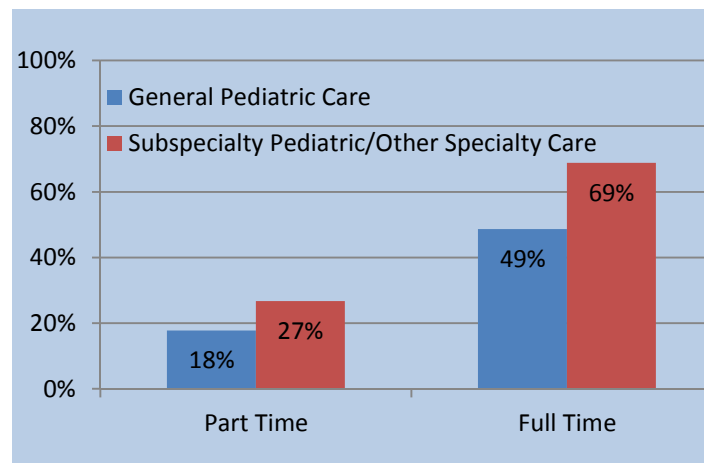


Figure 5. Post Training Participants with Income ≥ \$150,000 by Position Type

- One-third of the recent grad post training group and nearly 3/4 of the older group who are working full-time report \$150,000 or more a year including salary, bonus and profit sharing contributions (data not shown). Figure 5 shows that participants spending the majority of their time providing pediatric subspecialty or other specialty care are more likely to report higher income than those spending the majority of their time providing general pediatric care.

Figure 4. Percentage of Participants Very Concerned about Their Educational Debt

Fall Survey and Congratulations to Dr. Amador Loya

Over 80% of participants completed the first fall survey with only 2 requests – thank you! Participants who returned the survey by December 28, 2012 were included in a drawing for an iPad3.
