Neonatal Resuscitation Program 8th Edition Launches in June 2021

The Neonatal Resuscitation Program (NRP) Steering Committee has announced that the NRP 8th edition will launch on June 1, 2021. Hospitals may implement the NRP 8th edition materials at that time or continue with NRP 7th edition, but 8th edition materials must be in use by January 1, 2022. Almost 500 participants attended the NRP Current Issues Seminar at a live session at NCE, where the new NRP 8th edition was announced.

The Science

The International Liaison Committee on Resuscitation (ILCOR), composed of seven councils from around the world, evaluates resuscitation science for adults, children, and newborns. The Neonatal Life Support (NLS) Task Force of ILCOR, made up of neonatologists and other resuscitation experts including several members of the NRP Steering Committee, reviews the scientific literature as PICOST (Population, Intervention, Comparison, Outcome, Study Designs, Time Frame) questions using the Grading of Recommendations Assessment, Development, and Evaluations (GRADE) system. From these evaluations, ILCOR develops a Consensus on Science with Treatment Recommendations (CoSTR) document. After a public comment period and editing, the NLS Task Force publishes the results. The current review and treatment recommendations were published in Circulation in October 2020⁽¹⁾.

The Guidelines

The ILCOR resuscitation councils around the world use these consensus guidelines to develop guidelines appropriate for their systems of care and available resources. The AHA Neonatal Writing Group wrote the 2020 AHA Guidelines for Cardiovascular Care and Emergency Cardiac Care: Part 5: Neonatal Resuscitation. These guidelines for the United States and Canada were released on October 21, 2020 and

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co-published in the November editions of *Pediatrics* and *Circulation* ⁽²⁾.


The NRP 8th Edition Curriculum

The NRP Steering Committee used these guidelines to create the NRP 8th edition education materials. The CoSTR documents and the AHA guidelines for neonatal resuscitation yielded no major changes in practice. However, scientific research over the past five years has resulted in new and higher grades of evidence to support previous recommendations. In addition, several practices have been revised in the interest of patient safety and educational efficacy (Table 1).

The NRP 8th edition algorithm incorporates only minor changes from the NRP 7th edition algorithm (see Figure). The algorithm shown here will appear in the *Textbook of Neonatal Resuscitation, 8th edition* and the accompanying educational materials. It differs from the algorithm in the AHA guidelines for neonatal resuscitation document in style and word choice for educational efficiency, but it does not conflict with the published science.

In addition to updated familiar content, the 8th edition textbook will feature Supplemental Lessons that will include information about ethics, choreography of codes, resuscitation outside of the delivery room, and quality



improvement practices related to resuscitation. These new chapters will not be subjects of test questions, but will provide useful practice recommendations.

Two Provider tracks will be offered by the NRP 8th edition curriculum: NRP Essentials (includes skills through facemask ventilation and laryngeal mask insertion) and NRP Advanced (all resuscitation skills for term and preterm newborns). Each facility will determine who should take NRP Essentials or NRP Advanced.

A New Collaboration

The AAP and RQI Partners, LLC announced their collaboration at NCE on October 6, 2020. RQI® for NRP will also launch in June 2021 as a self-directed, simulationbased, mastery learning and quality improvement resuscitation program designed to use low-dose, highfrequency quarterly learning and skills sessions. A webinar on February 18, 2021 will provide comprehensive

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information about RQI for NRP and the NRP 8th edition curriculum.

Let's take some time to reflect on each of our special interest groups:

TECaN (Trainees and Early Career Neonatologists) was started in 2008. This group includes fellows and

neonatologists within 7 years of completion of fellowship and focuses on advocacy, career development, education, global health, leadership, quality improvement (QI) and research. Their "Navigating NAS" campaign was engaging and widely lauded. The current Chair is Ashley Lucke and mentors are Heather Burris and Dmitry Duchovny. TECaN members continue to rise to leadership roles where they consistently shine and hone their skills as the neonatology leaders of tomorrow. Watch for their excellent podcasts on career development. TECaN serves as an award-winning model for similar SIG development in other sections.

MidCaN was formed 4 years ago to attend to the interests and needs of neonatologists at the peak of their professional trajectories, between 7-17 years from fellowship training. The current Co-Chairs are Alexis Davis and Dena Hubbard. MidCaN has focused on wellness, negotiation, education skills, mentorship, advocacy, promotion and QI. They recently produced an outstanding series of webinars on leadership with Ms. Laurie Baedke which can be accessed from their web page.

WiN has a wonderful acronym and addresses the needs and interests of women neonatologists, who will soon comprise 75% of incoming fellowship cohorts. This group promotes networking of female neonatologists, recognizes inspiring women colleagues and recently hosted a stellar two-part webinar series with Dr. Bonnie Koo on finances for women neonatologists, and a leadership webinar featuring Dr. Catherine DeAngelis (the first woman editor of *JAMA*). These can still be accessed through their web page. An article by Marilyn Escobedo in this newsletter issue recaps what WiN has accomplished in a few short years.

Rounding out our career stage interest groups, the Well-Established Career Neonatologists (**WECaN**), led by Stephen Pearlman, provides a forum for the challenges and new opportunities of neonatologists as careers mature. WECaN includes neonatologists beyond 17 years from training and has focuses on career alternatives, mentor development and leadership. They have hosted interesting conference sessions and their web page highlights resources helpful in addressing issues related to retirement, quality, and assessing competence as we age.

We have had 12-14 neonatologists attend the AAP Legislative Conference for the past several years. The **Advocacy Committee**, led by myself and Shetal Shah, is taking shape and focuses on legislative actions, as well as internal advocacy issues - like the ALF resolution process. SONPM has submitted a dozen resolutions over the past 3 years; all have passed, with 2 making it into the Top Ten. near future, along with tips on how to be an effective advocate in the presidential transition.

The **Quality Metrics Task Force**, conceived by David Burchfield, began so that neonatologists would set how our own performance is measured, rather than *US News and World Reports*. Several years of work culminated in about 80 neonatologists gathering in a Quality Metrics Summit hosted at AAP headquarters in September of 2019. Thanks to John Zupancic, Munish Gupta, Heather Kaplan, Michael Prendergast, Mark Hudak, and many others for making this such a valuable meeting of the minds. Look for a white paper to come from this work to guide how we calibrate our clinical care in the near future.

Ron Ariagno has focused the Section's attention on the importance of **Neonatal Therapeutics** to assure that the safety and effectiveness of treatments and devices used in our NICUs receive the attention that our patients deserve. This group has explored how to facilitate participation in clinical trials networks, liaison relationships with the FDA and other regulatory organizations and we are now in the process of transitioning from an exploratory task force to a systematized strategy for including neonates in sound therapeutic investigation.

Many of our members hold leadership roles - as NICU medical directors, practice managers, quality directors, transport directors or fellowship directors. They share the need for skills in management of people, budgets, data, QI and leading teams through the process of change. The **Clinical Leaders** working group brings these colleagues together to learn collaboratively. Following an initial virtual conference, a series of webinars was launched in 2020. The first covered quality dashboards; subsequent sessions will address advance communication skills and change management.

Global Health in the perinatal period is of interest to neonatologists in many phases of their careers. All of us have trained in NRP and many of us are familiar with Helping Babies Breathe and the HBS suite. A new project will partner with local stakeholders through an ECHO platform. Carl Bose has long been a leader in these efforts, along with other experienced neonatologists and rising stars like Danielle Ehret and Sharla Rent. We partner with organizations like VON to improve care and outcomes for babies around the world.

A new area of interest is **NICU Follow-up**. We have just launched a working group to explore strategies to assure that appropriate guidance sets the standard for the care received by graduates of our NICUs. We look forward to the recommendations of this group, led by Ricki Goldstein.

We have standing committees for **Research**, **Fellow Education**, **ONTPD**, **Member Education**, **Website**, **Media** and Communications, as well as liaison relationships with partner organizations. We continue to devote resources and energy to our regular conferences and recognition events. All of these will benefit from the engagement and cross-talk of all of our members.

In this message, I celebrate the strength of neonatologists joining together with other like-minded Section members to make impressive progress. However, similar and overlapping passions - advocacy, leadership, QI, career development, wellness, global health, equity and disparities - are interesting to many of our SIGs. In 2021, you will see us work to coordinate and unify the work of all of our groups through the website and other centralized Section channels so that we foster synergy, avoid duplicated effort and make it easier for members to find what they're seeking. We also want to realize economies of scale that can be shared across the Section-such as the new Section Zoom accounts provided to several SIGs to support their webinars and virtual meetings. Like the many braided rivulets on a glacial outwash plain coalescing into a river, when we join together we will be a force to be reckoned with.

ONTPD Update

While COVID-19 continues to hinder our abilities to gather in person, this crisis has served to fuel innovation in education and connectivity. Albeit virtual and condensed, the fall ONTPD meeting was a wonderful opportunity to connect with colleagues and hear updates from the ACGME (Caroline Fischer, Susie Buchter), ABP (Suzanne Woods), and Council on Pediatric Subspecialties (Renate

Savich) and discuss best-practice approaches to fellow recruitment and virtual education. Dr. Renate Savich provided an informative yet sobering talk about the future of the neonatology workforce. One-third of the current neonatology workforce is over the age of 60 and there are not enough fellow applicants into neonatology to replace our retiring colleagues! Conversations and action plans to recruit into and increase the neonatology pipeline are essential and ongoing. Dr. Angela Ellison, the Associate Chair of Diversity and Equity at The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, spoke about "Diversity and Inclusion in Pediatrics and Neonatology." Dr. Ellison's take-home message is to focus efforts on retention and recruitment of faculty and fellows under-represented in medicine and that individual divisions need to think about both a short and a long-term plan to do this.

The ONTPD Boot Camp, directed by Melissa Carbajal, Liz Bonachea, and Melissa Bauserman, continues to draw a crowd. This workshop provides educational and programmatic basics of running a fellowship program in a collegial and entertaining forum.

Fellowship training programs have just completed their first virtual recruitment season. Overall, the informal feedback has been reassuring that fellowship programs were able to effectively convey programmatic information, provide a glimpse into institutional culture, and have meaningful conversations with applicants. Increasing comfort with videoconferencing, flexible scheduling of interviews, and decreased costs for programs and applicants have the ONTPD community wondering if inperson recruitment will ever return to its former model. Fellowship programs located in smaller cities report that in-person visits are incredibly helpful for recruitment, suggesting that hybrid models, comprised of both virtual and in-person activities, may be preferred. It will be important to ascertain a broad understanding of strengths and challenges of virtual recruitment from both fellowship programs and applicants moving forward.

Many ONTPD members are reporting a five to ten percent increase in fellowship program applications. The overall applicant numbers are not yet available from the National Resident Matching Program but it does appear as though individual applicants are applying to more programs given the ease of virtual interviewing. Match Day is rapidly approaching. Best of luck to all programs!

The "ONTPD Online with Experts" lecture series continues to hold twice monthly seminars led by national experts on clinical and physiologic topics relevant to fellowship education. These seminars occur the first and third Wednesday of the month at 12pm pacific/3pm eastern. Recordings of these seminars are archived on MedEdOnTheGo.com. ONTPD Virtual Cafes are now occurring quarterly and provide NPM fellowship PDs/APDs an opportunity to meet informally to discuss current issues impacting fellowship training. Activity on the ONTPD group chat through GroupMe continues to provide the community with real-time crowd sourcing and support.

We will hold our annual ONTPD spring meeting during virtual PAS. Date and time are TBD. As in years past, we will focus this meeting on scholarship aspects and needs of fellowship training.

Our ONPTD sub-committees remain active and continue to work on initiatives to support our NPM PD/APD community. We encourage your feedback and participation in the ONTPD through communication with the council, attendance at meetings, and involvement with committees.

National Neonatology Curriculum Committee (NNCC) (Chair Heather French)

We are very excited to announce the publication of all of the completed simulation cases to the ONTPD website: https://services.aap.org/en/community/aapsections/sonpm/ontpd/educational-resources/. The cases are located under the section entitled "Facilitator Guides" on ONTPD's education page. This project has been a success due to tremendous effort on the part of >80 educators (including Editor Lindsay Johnston and Associate Editors Rita Dadiz, Kristen Glass, Christie Bruno, and Carol Lynn O'Dea) who participated in authoring, reviewing, and piloting 57 simulation cases. Where appropriate, simulation cases are linked with physiology topics to provide additional opportunities to reinforce physiologic concepts. Additionally, an online neonatologyfocused ECMO course, led by Lindsay Johnston, continues to be developed by national experts, with some of the initial programs recently published. This course includes flipped classroom guides to work through ECMO scenarios and emergencies. MedEdOnTheGo.com is continuing to support this work by providing a free, online platform to house videos and supporting educational materials for learners. Supporting educational materials for facilitators have been moved to the ONTPD website.

Annual PD Survey (Chair Lindsay Johnston)

Given the very positive response by our community, ONTPD continues to conduct an annual survey of all NPM PDs each spring. The 2020 survey focused on assessment, procedural training, PD scholarship and wellness. Data was shared with the ONTPD community during the AAP meeting. Access to this information allows programs to benchmark performance, advocate for additional funding/resources, and share best practices.

Standard Forms Committee (Chair Heidi Karpen)

Standard forms that are useful for fellowship PDs are uploaded to the ONTPD website. We will continue to update this resource for PDs.

Fellowship Director Mentorship Committee (Chair Melissa Carbajal)

We continue to facilitate pairing mentor/mentee relationships among APDs and PDs. Section Sponsored Fellow Research Conferences Go Virtual Ann R Stark MD, FAAP

The national and regional research conferences for fellows sponsored by the NPM Section Education Committee get consistently high marks for the wonderful learning and networking opportunities they provide. Therefore, when the pandemic forced cancellation of the national Perinatal and Developmental Medicine Symposium in Snowmass, CO, in June, we decided to go virtual. As with all other meetings and events this year, we would of course prefer to be together in a wonderful place than sit alone in front of our computers, however, I am pleased to report that our virtual approach has provided the next best thing.

Virtual fellows meetings held to date include the Northeastern Regional Conference on Perinatal Research in October, typically held in Chatham, MA, and the national Perinatal and Developmental Medicine Symposium in November, typically held in Bonita Springs, FL. The chair of each meeting strategized with their co-chairs to develop programs that contained the best elements of the inperson meetings, while accommodating a shorter meeting time and, for the national meeting, four time zones. As always, fellows each gave a ten-minute talk on their research with time for questions. Faculty and advisory board members provided written anonymous feedback on the individual presentations as previous attendees have valued this. Invited faculty members gave talks on their research program that included their own career trajectory. Since career advice panel discussions led by the faculty and co-chairs have always been a favorite, we arranged simultaneous chat rooms so that small groups of faculty and fellows could discuss a variety of career topics such as job applications, negotiation, and balancing work and life. To incorporate some fun activities, Jeff Reese, the national meeting Chair, officiated a scavenger hunt and Zoom Bingo games. Professional technical support for the meetings made them run smoothly.

Program Directors and Division Chiefs receive invitations for their fellows to participate three to four months before the meeting. Both the Perinatal and Developmental Medicine Symposia and the Regional Conferences on Perinatal Research require an abstract with the application and attendees are selected by the co-chairs based on abstract quality. For the national conferences, the Program Director selects one fellow to apply. For the regional conferences, any number of fellows may apply from each fellowship program.

Women in Neonatology: What's Up and What's Next?

The Facts:

Women have become half of all neonatologists and the majority of new neonatologists finishing fellowships, a welcome milestone. Yet, women in neonatology and medicine:

- Hold a minority of subspecialty leadership positions as division chiefs (only ~20%), medical directors, committee chairs, speakers/panelists at scientific and educational meetings
- Earn less than male peers of the same age, rank and responsibility (\$30,000 less annually)
- Report fewer mentor relationships
- Find work/life balance difficult, almost unattainable
- Suffer more microaggressions, sex discrimination, and harassment than men
- Have diminished opportunities, awards, and honors than male peers

They recognize that these problems exist not only in our subspecialty but in our society as a whole. In addition, recent data would indicate that women are not making any progress in these areas.

A few women decided to quit complaining and DO something about it. Christiane Dammann, Renate Savich, Marilyn Escobedo, Clara Song, Krithika Lingappan, and Shazia Bhombal met in a quiet corner of a bar at a PAS meeting and discussed possibilities. They decided that as women neonatologists we need to help ourselves and each other to achieve leadership positions, develop individual careers, practice self-care, advocate for the things we are passionate about, communicate effectively with each other, support our colleagues (both male and female) and use the power of the group to achieve these aims. In other words: Let's find our voice and take action!

An organizational meeting was planned for the 2018 Workshop in Scottsdale and a survey was sent out. The survey confirmed the need and identified five areas of concern: Leadership, career development, advocacy, wellness, and communication. Over 70 women gathered for the inaugural meeting. Women in Neonatology (WiN) was off and running! The purpose of WiN was determined to be:

- To promote the professional careers and personal wellbeing of women in neonatology
- To create a peer network to foster women's leadership and professional development
- To support advocacy by and for women in neonatology
- To address issues of gender inequity and disparity in our field

Subsequently, at the 2018 NCE meeting, over 100 women gathered to hear Jennifer Arnold, neonatologist of TV fame, speak inspirationally on "Think Big." In 2019, the WiN meeting at the Scottsdale Workshop featured Dr. Mangurian from UCSF leading a program on "What's Holding Women Back?" and the NCE meeting in New Orleans featured a lively discussion led by Dr. Rhonda Achonulu from Montefiore on "Implicit Bias." The interaction and enthusiasm of all participants at these meetings was amazing.

Namrita Jain Odackal, the creator of the catchy WiN logo, was invited to be the Newsflash Editor in late 2018. She publishes the Newsflash monthly. With continued awareness of and support for WiN from the AAP and SONPM, the WiN Steering Committee met in Itasca, IL in 2019 to plan our future. The WiN Steering Committee drafted a vision, a mission, and a strategic plan (and a budget!). Given increasing member participation, Jessica Madden and Karen Hussein became WiN Website Editor and Co-Editor in 2019 to improve WiN's online presence and communication.

The pandemic year of 2020 required a total rewrite of plans. Our face-to-face meetings have become webinars:

August - "Our Money, Ourselves" – Women taking control of their finances with Dr. Bonnie Koo had 324 registrants and 158 live participants.

September - "Dollars and Sense" - Smart money management for women docs by Dr. Koo with 169 registrants and about 91 participants.

WiN What's Up and What's Next?

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- October Dr. Catherine DeAngelis, "Leadership Challenges for Women Physicians," 294 registrants and 164 live participants.
- November "2020 Journey" with the WiN Steering Committee and breakout sessions for the standing Committees for Leadership (Kris Reber), Advocacy (Christiane Dammann), Wellness (Dena Hubbard), Communications/Networking (Clara Song with Jessica Madden and Karen Hussein), Membership (Namrita Odackal and Shazia Bhombal) and Career Development (Jasmeet Kataria-Hale and Krithika Lingappan).

The advocacy effort, headed up by Christiane Dammann, in concert with several other sections in the AAP, has made huge progress on the effort to get physicians paid family leave. The proposal made the top 10 AAP Annual Leadership Forum list.

Efforts are in the making for mentors for leadership and career development pairing, surveys to identify inequities for action, workshops for negotiation skills, and platforms for virtual meetings. Many more ideas are in development.

The WiN Steering Committee has been chaired by Marilyn Escobedo, who has handed the gavel to Renate Savich as the 2020 Chair and Christiane Dammann as the Chair-Elect. Two more members for the Steering Committee will be needed. Interest in these positions should be directed to Renate Savich or any one of the current Steering Committee members: Marilyn Escobedo, Renate Savich, Christiane Dammann, Shazia Bhombal, Krithika Lingappan, Namrita Odackal, and Clara Song.

Margaret Mead, the famous anthropologist, said, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world." We should have no doubt that women in neonatology are thoughtfully committed to make changes for a better world for women in neonatology.

How Old is Too Old?

As I am writing this column in early November, the outcome of the election seems certain. Obviously, age has been an issue raised in our presidential election with both major party candidates in their seventies. Concerns for the candidates' physical and mental well-being have been raised by the political parties, as well as by journalists. Yet, we have many other people in the public eye who are very active in their own fields who are over seventy. In journalism, there are Leslie Stahl and Bob Woodward. Active musicians such as Mick Jagger, Eric Clapton, Paul McCartney and Bob Dylan are all over 70 and Tony Bennett is over 90. Actors in the same age bracket who are still performing include Robert DeNiro, Dustin Hoffman, Sophia Loren and Al Pacino. Probably nobody but WECaN members will know who some of these people are.

Which brings me to my central question: How old is too old to be taking care of sick newborn babies? It might help us to answer this question by first considering other industries. For example, the aviation field has very strict policies around retirement. Establishing such policies can be tricky because of age discrimination laws. In fact, the aviation industry received a congressional exemption for the age discrimination rules in order to enforce their policy. But is aging an accurate proxy for competence? Many think not.

Aging is a growing concern in the practice of medicine. In 2015, over 240,000 physicians over 65 years of age were still practicing. In 2020, Skarupski et al. from the Bloomberg School of Public Health at Johns Hopkins published in Academic Medicine that physicians over 55 years of age constitute 32% of medical school faculty, a greater percentage than people of that age in the general population. Their study also showed that only 42% of institutions had a policy around the late career physician. White et al. from the University of Washington and UT Austin published another paper of interest on this subject in BMJ Quality and Safety in 2019. They performed a qualitative study, through interviews and focus groups, with stakeholders including medical board members, CMOs, senior and junior physicians, nurses, and patient advocates. The themes they identified included lax professional self-regulation of late career physicians and that key factors to be addressed in policies are patient safety and physician well-being.

Who should be developing these policies? Since there are many stakeholders, it is probably best to have a multidisciplinary group work on establishing the rules around the assessment of competence of late career physicians. Late career physicians deserve a place at the table as institutions ponder these issues. Institutions should take the lead in developing and enforcing these policies rather than state or certifying boards, but they may encounter resistance from late career physicians when asked to comply.

WECaN obviously has a stake in how these policies are developed and how they apply to those in our specialty. One could ask many questions: Should there be a mandatory retirement age? Should there be cognitive or dexterity testing done beyond a certain age? If so, how often should testing be done? If you are interested in participating or leading an effort to define which factors should be considered in policies related to late career neonatologists, please contact me at Spearlman@christianacare.org.

There is no question that our next president is in his eighth decade and we do not have a national policy to assess the competence of our leaders. However, the stakes are high in medicine and we should be providing input into the policies that will impact our lives. In the words of a couple of old guys named Paul Simon and Art Garfunkel, "Old friends, sharing a park bench like bookends..."

2020 AAP Virtual NCE SONPM Scientific Session

I had the honor of chairing the Scientific Abstract Session on the first day of the SONPM Program, along with the remarkable Program Chair, Dr. Clara Song. Transitioning an in-person, live conference to an all virtual conference was a monumental undertaking by the AAP and Dr. Song which, I think we can all agree, they pulled off quite well!

We had a strong showing for abstract submissions with a total of 264 submitted for our Section Program. These abstracts were reviewed and 90 were accepted for either the virtual poster hall or for oral abstract presentations. The following were the 10 abstracts that were chosen for oral presentation:

The presentations were outstanding and all of the authors should be congratulated on their efforts and important studies. After a very close competition, two oral presentations rose to the top and were awarded the Young Investigator Awards for the 2020 Program. Overall, despite the pivot to a virtual format, the abstract session was well-attended, well-received, and quite enlightening. During the session, we had a maximum of 222 attendees that joined the virtual meeting.

The Section Program will feature an enriching, collaborative environment with topics focused on how the environment impacts pregnancy and newborn development; cutting-edge topics in genetics including diagnosis and therapies; and a session on state-of-the-art developments in neonatology such as machine learning, a system approach to care, and caring for the brain-injured newborn.

2020 SONPM Program at the Virtual AAP NCE

This year's fall meeting in October was the first ever virtual National Convention and Exhibition for the AAP! We opened the 2020 SONPM program, #SONPM2020, on Saturday after a brief technical kerfuffle. Once the link was all sorted out, we were Zooming! (Literally)

Day One of #SONPM2020 included the Scientific Abstract Session, the weekend-long Poster Session, an update from the Committee on Fetus and Newborn (COFN) and a report from *NeoReviews*. Congratulations to all of our top abstract presenters, especially the two Young Investigator Awardees, Drs. Jacqueline Gallup and Deepika Sankaran. We also heard about the competitive Marshall Klaus Research Awards and the ten astounding 2020 recipients. The day continued with a COFN update from Chair, Dr. James Cummings, who at the spry young age of 63 will soon by getting his private pilot's license. Our first day concluded with the 20th anniversary *NeoReviews* report from Editor Dr. Dara Brodsky, who also happens to be an international ski sensation having skied on 21 different mountains.

The main attraction of Day Two was the Neonate with Cardiac Disease and the Multidisciplinary Team Care Approach. This Joint SONPM session with the Section on Cardiology and Cardiac Surgery (SOCCS) opened strong with an introduction of the Neonatal Cardiac Care Collaborative (NeoC3) by Dr. Victor Levy who is a neonatal and cardiac intensivist, as well as a pediatric cardiologist. Pediatric cardiologist Dr. Nelangi Pinto, and pediatric interventional cardiologist Dr. Laurie Armsby, then joined Dr. Levy for a case-based conversation on pre-operative assessment and management. Another triple threat, neonatal and cardiac intensivist and pediatric cardiologist Dr. Rune Toms, discussed feeding controversies for these

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vulnerable neonates with increased pulmonary blood flow. His tips: Early protein, zinc and vitamin D (protocols included!). Neonatal intensivist Dr. Maria Fraga discussed an individualized approach for monitoring systemic perfusion and oxygen delivery with minimally invasive technologies such as cardiac MRI, targeted neonatal ECHO (TnECHO), transcutaneous Doppler, electrical biosensing technology, and NIRS. Dr. Patrick McNamara neonatal intensivist, PanAmerican Hemodynamics Collaborative Chair and father to a Division I collegiate soccer player - carried on the torch of defining the hemodynamically significant ductus arteriosus and advocated for a rational approach emphasizing shunt volume, architecture and individualized precision medicine using non-invasive monitoring technologies. Neonatal intensivist, pediatric cardiologist and father to a high school football star, Dr. Carl Backes, Jr. followed with detailed insights on the FDA-approved transcatheter closure device for the ductus, the Amplatzer Piccolo

You round on her before surgery, make ventilator and fluid adjustments, and discuss her condition with the anesthesiologist and cardiac surgeon. Rounding, writing orders, discussions with surgical team, and note completion takes 70 minutes.

Occluder. All faculty of Day Two chimed in for rich discussion after a case presentation by our TECaN Chair, Dr. Ashley Lucke, who brilliantly presented with a toddler in her lap (the reality for many Women in Neonatology!).

Day Three kicked off with an SONPM update from our now Past Chair, Dr. Mark Hudak, who delivered his final set of awards and shout-outs as Chair. Notably, Cleanest Basement was awarded to Dr. Shetal Shah, who moderated from his basement on Sunday. Dr. Hudak reminded us of the amazing accomplishments from our Section despite the significant perturbations of this past year. We continued right along with discussions on cardiopulmonary dysfunction in the preterm and critically ill neonate from our neonatal hemodynamic experts. Dr. Shahab Noori, another veteran TnECHO guru, who resuscitated his own son at delivery then sat for the neonatal-perinatal medicine boards two hours later, detailed the monumental changes that occur in transitional circulation in the minutes after delivery and showed early NIRS patterns for preterm infants with and without

intraventricular hemorrhage. Neonatal intensivist and TnECHO/hemodynamics authority, Dr. Regan Giesinger scrutinized the challenges of defining and managing hypotension in our neonates, and reminded us the "kidney is boss" in determining the systemic vascular resistance, except when cardiac function is compromised. Dr. McNamara returned on Day Three to plunge into precise approaches to pulmonary hypertension with use of TnECHO (Key points: Physiologic shunts can be your friend, iNO is not always the answer). Dr. Gabriel Altit neonatal intensivist, hemodynamic expert, and spinning instructor - detailed these friendly shunting patterns that occur with myocardial dysfunction in disease states such as hypoxic-ischemic encephalopathy and congenital diaphragmatic hernia. Another neonatal intensivist/cardiologist and TnECHO/ POCUS phenom, Dr. Shazia Bhombal of Stanford University, who is ambidextrous, emphasized the critical importance of left ventricular diastolic function and the deleterious effects on the pulmonary vascular bed when dysfunction is present (think of HLHS with intact septum and the nutmeg lung). Dr. Noori returned for an encore performance for a final overview of precision medicine and management of neonatal hemodynamic compromise. Interspersed in the afternoon were two noteworthy case scenarios presented by TECaN members Drs. Jasmeet Katerina-Hale and Ahmed Almaazmi, inspiring conversation on the care of shock for term versus preterm infants.

Given the virtual platform, the heavy lifting was executed by the moderating mavens of the weekend - Drs. Optimal Inspired Oxygen Weaning Strategy Following Return of Spontaneous Circulation after Perinatal Asphyxial Arrest

Deepika Sankaran completed her medical training and a two-year pediatric residency at Madras Medical College, India. She proceeded to pediatric residency at Flushing Hospital Medical Center in Queens, NY and neonatal fellowship training at State University of New York, Buffalo where she worked on an ovine model of perinatal asphyxial arrest. She evaluated the effect of



different epinephrine doses and flush volumes on the incidence of and time to achieving return of spontaneous circulation, under the guidance of her mentors Dr. Satyan Lakshminrusimha and Dr. Praveen Chandrasekharan. She is currently an Assistant Professor of Pediatrics and a board certified neonatologist at University of California Davis, Sacramento, CA. Her current research is on oxygen use during neonatal resuscitation and following recovery

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from asphyxial arrest. She has received research grant funding from the Children's Miracle Network at UC Davis to investigate the cardiovascular effects of prenatal methamphetamine exposure and the prevalence of prenatal methamphetamine use among the pregnant women delivering in a community hospital vs. university hospital (clinical) setting.

Randomized Trial of Surfactant Therapy via Laryngeal Mask Airwav vs. Brief Tracheal Intubation



Jacqueline Gallup received her Bachelor of Arts in Biological Sciences from Binghamton University and her Doctor of Medicine degree from State University of New York Upstate Medical University. She completed pediatric residency at Albany Medical Center and is board certified in pediatrics. She received fellowship training in Neonatal and Perinatal Medicine at Albany Medical

Center, which she completed in September of 2020. Her research during fellowship included a randomized control trial comparing surfactant administration via laryngeal mask airway vs. the INSURE (intubation-surfactantextubation) approach, in collaboration with Dr. Joaquim MB Pinheiro. 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Coding Answer (Question on page 12)

The correct answer is B - 99291, hourly critical care 30-74 minutes.

If > 74 minutes of care were required, additional segments of 30 minutes may be added by reporting 99292. When hourly critical care codes (99291/2) are reported, it is imperative that the total critical care time be recorded in the progress note.

Ventilator management is bundled with hourly critical care, making D incorrect.

Answer A, 99469, is incorrect. When transferring the critical patient to a different individual in a different group, the transferring individual reports time-based critical care services while the receiving individual from the different group reports the inpatient neonatal/pediatric critical care code. The PICU physician receiving the infant in transfer of care, by virtue of being of a different medical specialty from the neonatologist, would be considered a different group even if they are both part of the same large multi-specialty group

Answer C, 99239, is incorrect as the infant is being transferred to another physician, not discharged from the hospital.

Correct ICD-10 codes include:

Q23.0 Congenital stenosis of aortic valve

P28.5 Respiratory failure of newborn

Be careful in using your EMR code selection tool. If you simply search aortic stenosis you may be directed to a code in Chapter 10, such as I35.0 Nonrheumatic aortic (valve) stenosis. For all congenital heart defects, the correct ICD-10 code should begin with Q. Also note that if the infant was born in your hospital, the appropriate Z code denoting a live birth would also be used. These codes are only for the birth hospital. If the infant was transferred to you from a different hospital, the Z code would not be used.

What has been your education and career path so far?

I completed medical school at the University of Ibadan College Of Medicine in Ibadan, Nigeria and served a year of rotational

internship at the University College Hospital in Ibadan. We have started enrollment in the NICHD NRN Cycled Phototherapy randomized trial for extremely preterm infants, looking at using either continuous phototherapy, or phototherapy that turns off intermittently each hour for a period of time (https://clinicaltrials.gov/ct2/show/NCT0392783 3).

We are working with the NRN on modifying Network policies and procedures to allow non-NRN sites to participate in individual trials, and hope to have updates on this by the next Newsletter.

We have also begun our participation in the NICHD-sponsored study of the Eat, Sleep Console approach to opiate weaning (https://clinicaltrials.gov/ct2/show/NCT0405782 0), with **Rachel Greenberg** leading the study's coordinating center. **Bill Malcolm** is leading our local multidisciplinary effort.

We will see the last baby for follow-up from our phase I study of allogeneic cord tissue mesenchymal stromal cells in December, so results should be available soon.

The Conference will conclude with the presentation of the fluid and electrolyte management of the ELBW infant and discussion of the NEST trial focused on NEC/SIP. California Perinatal Quality Care Collaborative (CPQCC)

Our thoughts are with all of the healthcare workers on the front lines during this challenging time. CPQCC is committed to providing the highest level of support to those caring for pregnant women and newborns across the state during the pandemic, including through our COVID-19 webinar series and resource website.

Recordings of our three most recent Supporting Your Perinatal Units during COVID-19 webinars are also available on our website: "Health Equity for California Latinx Communities" (9/29/20, available in Spanish with a text translation of the webinar audio accompanying the translated slides), "Breastfeeding Guidance" (9/10/20), "Evolving Guidance" (8/21/20). We will continue to update our COVID-19 resource website with the latest organizational recommendations, patient resources, and data as it becomes available.

On September 30, the CPQCC QI collaborative component of the Mother and Baby Substance Exposure Initiative ended. The Initiative was a partnership between CPQCC, the California Maternal Quality Care Collaborative, and Health Management Associates to improve outcomes for mothers and newborns impacted by substance exposure, with a specific focus on Opioid Use Disorder. The Initiative emphasized care that maintains the mother-baby dyad throughout the hospital stay and addresses treatment and prevention of substance exposure during and after pregnancy. Funded by the California Department of Health Care Services as part of a Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration State Opioid Response grant, the Initiative included a statewide collaborative involving obstetric and neonatal teams at 37 hospitals and the development of an interactive online toolkit on perinatal substance exposure for maternal and newborn care providers.

Clinical Leaders Group Update

The SONPM Clinical Leaders Group (CLG) is up and running! This special interest group was formed in early 2020 as a collaborative community for NICU medical directors, quality directors, and others interested in clinical leadership. A survey by Jim Barry and others identified numerous gaps in training for NICU clinical leaders (Barry *et al., J Perinatology,* 2019), and CLG was created to try to help bridge these gaps. After a successful kick-off webinar in May, there was much enthusiasm and support for further group activities.

For 2020-2021, we planned three virtual workshops. The first was in October, and featured a volunteer panel from members of our group who came together to deliver a program on QI dashboards in the NICU. During this well-attended online event, we discussed the evolution of dashboards, dashboard theory, and dashboard creation, and walked through some examples from our colleagues. This discussion prompted interest in more focused groups for spin-off projects and deeper dives into dashboard development. Our next virtual workshop will be in early February and will cover the topic of Change Management.

Our third workshop will be in the later spring and will cover the topic of Crucial Conversations. Already, two more teams of volunteers from CLG are working on developing resources and presentations for these workshops. Look for announcements with the exact dates and times TBD.

We are working to get our special interest group website, with associated collaboration site, launched soon. The website will house our calendar of workshops, listserv sign-up space, surveys, and features on topics relevant to medical directors and quality leaders. We also hope to create a system for linking junior leaders with more senior mentors. Please check the site from time to time for updates and for links to recordings of past workshops.

We are excited by the enthusiasm and collaborative spirit that filled CLG's first webinar and workshop, and we are eager to see what this group can do. NICU Verification Update Ann R Stark MD, FAAP

Beginning with the first version of Toward Improving the Outcome of Pregnancy in 1976, a coordinated system of regional perinatal services organized according to the capabilities of each facility has been considered the standard for optimal maternal and neonatal care. Since then, multiple studies have established that outcomes of preterm or ill infants are optimal when they are cared for in a facility with the personnel and equipment appropriate to their gestational age, illness severity, and complexity. An American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) Policy Statement, "Levels of Neonatal Care," initially published in 2004, updated in 2012 and subsequently reaffirmed, and Guidelines for Perinatal Care, a joint publication of the AAP and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, defines characteristics of four levels of care ranging from newborn nursery (Level I) to the highest NICU level of care (IV), often located within a children's hospital.

Unfortunately, in the United States, 25% of very low birthweight infants are still born in hospitals without Level III NICUs, and thus are at risk for less than optimal outcomes. In addition, specifications for neonatal levels of service vary widely among states, including details of the regulations and whether or how compliance is tracked. For example, of 31 states with a designating authority to oversee neonatal levels of care, only 22 require ongoing monitoring and only 10 require site visits (Kroelinger CD, *J Perinatol* 2020).

An opportunity arose in 2013, when the Texas legislature passed rules that defined four levels of neonatal care. General requirements for all NICUs and specific requirements for each level were based primarily on the AAP Policy Statement, "Levels of Neonatal Care." The legislation specified that all hospitals be designated at a specific level of care in order to receive Medicaid payments. Designation required an on-site survey by a neonatologist and neonatal nurse, and a pediatric surgeon if surgery was performed at the facility, to verify that all requirements were met. The AAP NICU Verification Program was developed in response to a call for survey agencies by the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) and provided an opportunity to lay groundwork for national standards that could be adopted by other states or by hospitals without state mandates.

With encouragement from AAP leadership, financial support from Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and collaboration with the American College of Surgeons that was starting to develop the Children's Surgery Verification Program, a leadership team of neonatologists and neonatal nurses was formed that began to develop survey materials and training webinars and actively recruit surveyors. In May 2016, the Texas DSHS selected the AAP NICU Verification Program as one of two neonatal survey agencies and the AAP Board of Directors approved a pilot program for one year that became an official program the following year. Through August 2019, the end of the first reporting period and appeals process, the program completed 42 initial surveys and six appeal surveys.

Since Texas requires re-designation every three years, a second round of surveys was initiated in the fall of 2019. With the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, the program continued on-site surveys for a brief period with Texas-based surveyors; however, the Program suspended on-site surveys in April 2020, consistent with other national survey agencies. With COVID cases continuing to increase, a plan for virtual surveys was developed over the summer. This required substantial revision of survey agendas; requirements for screen sharing of medical records and other documents; and virtual tours of the NICU, Labor and Delivery, and Pharmacy. After Texas DSHS approval in August 2020, virtual surveys began in September, and demand is growing for additional virtual surveys in the coming months.

Other states, concerned about poorly-regulated NICU services, have expressed interest in an approach similar to Texas. During the past 18 months, planning has been underway with the Georgia Health Department. Georgia passed legislation that requires verification for Level II and III NICU designation and asked the NICU Verification Program to provide the surveys. In addition, requests for verification from independent hospitals and hospital systems have been received. To appropriately evaluate hospitals without specific state regulations, the NICU Verification Program leadership is developing national standards based on the" Levels of Neonatal Care" statement and held a virtual meeting of content experts and stakeholders in September 2020 to review the work to date.

As demand increases, the NICU Verification Program plans to build a reserve of trained, expert surveyors. Successful candidates will be seasoned leaders, preferably with experience evaluating programs, who meet the qualifications outlined on the AAP NICU Verification Program website: https://www.aap.org/en-us/advocacyand-policy/aap-health-initiatives/nicuverification/Pages/def ault.aspx

Julia Johnson MD, PhD

Assistant Professor of Pediatrics Johns Hopkins University

Dr. Johnson graduated from the College of William and Mary with majors in biology and international relations. Dr. Johnson is an Alpha Omega Alpha graduate of Eastern Virginia Medical School. She completed pediatric residency and a fellowship in Neonatal-Perinatal Medicine at Johns Hopkins University. Dr. Johnson joined the

faculty at Johns Hopkins in 2017. Her research interests include neonatal global health and infection prevention in low resource settings. Dr. Johnson has conducted CDCsupported research in Pune, India, describing the epidemiology of bloodstream infections in the NICU, identifying reservoirs of transmission for resistant Gramnegative bacteria for neonatal infections, and performing an interventional study to improve healthcare worker adherence to evidence-based infection prevention and control practices. She completed a PhD in Clinical Investigation at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health in 2020. Her thesis, "Healthcare-Associated Bloodstream Infections in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit in Pune, India: Epidemiology and Reduction of Risk," focused on QI and patient safety interventions in four Indian NICUs. She was awarded a K23 mentored career development award by the National Institutes of Health in July 2020, which will support her continued work on epidemiology of healthcare-associated bloodstream infections and infection prevention and control in the NICU in low resource settings.

For example, she was a project leader in a multidisciplinary initiative to reduce the time to treatment of neonatal seizures after implementation of an innovative seizure rescue process. Her current interest is in improving outcomes for extremely preterm infants with QI efforts in the UCSF Small Baby Unit and by working closely with her obstetrics colleagues to increase the rate of delayed cord clamping. As she transitions beyond fellowship, Katelin plans to continue to develop her skills in QI methodology with a goal to find new and creative ways to improve the care of newborns.

In Memoriam

It is with deep sadness that I am writing to let you know that Dr. Ira Adams-Chapman passed away on Tuesday, October 27th after a sudden illness

following a long battle with cancer. She was a kind, compassionate advocate for infants and children and recognized as being a master clinician by all of her colleagues. Her impact on our field and on many of us cannot be fully described. Dr. Adams-Chapman was an Associate Professor of Pediatrics and the Jennings Watkins Scholar in Neurosciences at Emory University School of Medicine. She was a beloved member of the Division of Neonatology at Emory and Children's Healthcare of Atlanta since 1998.

Dr. Adams-Chapman completed her undergraduate studies at Emory University, medical school at the Medical College of Georgia, pediatric residency training at Cincinnati Children's, and her fellowship training in neonatology at the University of California at San Diego. She also earned a MPH degree focused on health outcomes from Emory.

Ira served as the Medical Director for the Developmental Progress Clinic since 2002. She and her team have expanded services in the clinic to include routine developmental evaluations from hospital discharge to kindergarten. Understanding that neurodevelopmental outcome is modified by both medical and social risk factors, Dr. Adams-Chapman utilized a multi-disciplinary approach to enhance the quality of care and improve compliance for patients enrolled in clinical trials. Her clinical and research interests focused on the neurodevelopmental outcome of neonates with complications of prematurity, including intraventricular hemorrhage, sepsis, and necrotizing enterocolitis.

Ira served as the Follow-up Principal Investigator for the Eunice Kennedy Shriver NICHD Neonatal Research Network (NRN) for more than 15 years and led multiple collaborative studies to better understand outcomes of preterm and term infants. She made numerous contributions to the NRN, including publications evaluating the association between infection and adverse neurodevelopmental outcomes in preterm infants and on the impact of brain injury on outcomes in term and preterm infants.

She is survived by her two children – daughter Jordan and son Julian. Our thoughts and prayers are with Ira's family. She will be greatly missed.
